OUR NEW TRAINING BUILDING-STAYING LOCAL WHILE KEEPING SKILLS SHARP



Since 1924 members of the Point Pleasant Fire Co. # 1 have recognized the need for providing fire protection to our community and for the last 98 years have continued to evolve with the ever-changing demands of the fire service. In 2019, our department saw the need for a better way to train our members without traveling out of our coverage area so that we would still be available to respond to emergencies. And so, the process began.

After 3 years, countless hours of research, meetings and planning, this past spring we completed our new state of the art training building behind our fire station. The building, purchased from Fire Facilities Inc., is 22' x 66' and 30' tall. In this building we can perform all facets of firefighting and rescue training, including live fire operations, ladder, search and rescue, rappelling, and confined space training.

With this building our volunteers will be able to hone their skills, so they are prepared when an emergency occurs, and can safely return home to their families. We thank you for your continued support of our fund drive which helped make this project possible.

RYAN SHAFIK - 2022 VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR



ELECTRIC VEHICLES BRING NEW CHALLENGES TO FIRST RESPONDERS

Electric vehicles are becoming more and more popular and come with new challenges for first responders. In response to the rising incidents and concerns related to electric vehicles, the National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) recently released a report detailing findings that firefighters are at significant risk due to a lack of understanding of electric vehicle fires. There is a lot to learn since electric vehicles have Lithium-ion batteries and if it catches fire, it can burn much hotter than a standard car with a gasoline engine. Firefighters can direct a water stream right into the battery area to cool that with water but the batteries can easily re-ignite sometimes hours or even days later.

Electric vehicle fires require a greater amount of water and incidents can last hours longer due to multiple re-ignitions. In that way, electric vehicle fires are very different and potentially pose new risks for firefighters. Several common risks for first responders include electrical shock, extremely high temperatures, toxic fumes, Lithium burns (respiratory and skin reactions), toxic runoff and re-ignition up to 24 hours after initial extinguishment. Rest assured, our volunteers are continuously training on all aspects of fire fighting. Our members and other local sister companies recently took several training classes on Electric Vehicle Extinguishment and are fully prepared to handle electric vehicle fires.
